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


## CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

## **SELF HELP GROUPS**

#### Women Empowerment

The Hyderabad Archdiocese Social Service Society (HASSS) initiated the Women Development program in 1991, with a remarkable three-decade history of empowering marginalized women. The program aims to uplift women from socially backward, economically poor, and marginalized communities by organizing, sensitizing, and enabling them towards their overall development.

#### **KEY OBJECTIVES**



Organizing vulnerable poor women into small functional groups, comprising 10 to 20 members.



Croup leaders are democratically elected, and members are empowered to take up group responsibilities.



Conduct regular meetings, introduce savings, practice inter-lending among members



Networking among SHGs is encouraged to expand their scope.

## CONCEPT OF THRIFT

The program introduces the concept of thrift, encouraging savings among members, and provides credit access to its members. The quantum of loans and repayment terms are decided collectively by the group, savings and repayments are recycled to support other members.

## ▶ ROLE OF FIELD BASED ANIMATORS

SHG animators play a crucial role in social mobilization, organizing meetings, and explaining the objectives of the program. The Executive Director approves the formation of groups after periodical assessment.

## TIME FRAME, WITHDRAWAL & LOAN EXTENSION CRITERIA

HASSS supports and accompanies the groups for a period of six years. In the event of any misunderstandings, either party can withdraw with one month's notice. The extension of loans is considered after one year, based on regular conduct of meetings, active participation, and adherence to savings and inter-lending practices.

#### **►** ACHIEVEMENTS

The program has witnessed significant achievements, with women emerging as influential leaders in their communities, impacting family, community, and the village as a whole. They actively take up responsibilities in organizing meetings and managing savings and credit programs, and support other women. Some SHG leaders have successfully contested in local elections too.

She faced numerous challenges as a single mother supporting her son's education and arranging her daughter's marriage after her husband deserted the family. Struggling financially, she started a saree and blouse business at home with loan of Rs. 50,000 from the HASSS group. This allowed her to expand her business. With dedication, she now manages her shop, repays the loan, covers family expenses, and is immensely grateful to HASSS and her SHG supportive members.

Udumula Sunitha, a member of the Sramika HASSS Self Help Group, faced a series of hardships, including her husband's COVID-19-related death in 2021 and her son's hospitalization due to an accident, which depleted her savings and forced her to sell their home and use the proceeds for her daughter's wedding. The group, upon hearing her plight, prioritized her loan request, enabling her to start a kirana shop business. Sunitha now manages the shop, repays the loan, and saves for her future, expressing deep gratitude to HASSS and her SHG supportive members.

## **KOLPING INDIA**

#### Help for Self Help

Kolping India is a registered trust instituted following the ideals of Fr. Adolph Kolping, that envisions a just society based on love, truth, justice, brotherhood & cooperation. Since its inception in 1962, Kolping India has evolved as a development support organisation impacting millions of lives in the rural India.

Kolping India's primary goal is poverty reduction through the self-help concept. Members contribute annual subscriptions and receive registration numbers for future correspondence. The HASSS program supports group maintenance with essential books, aided by Kolping Program Coordinators who actively engage in village group meetings, ensuring updated records. Education on group dynamics, savings, and internal lending is provided by Regional Program Coordinators and office bearers, with 80% of members benefiting from internal loans. Common issues are collectively addressed after one year, emphasizing self-help. Currently, 59 Kolping India Family Groups exist, with leaders compiling stakeholder profiles to drive further community development programs.



They faced a challenge when Anusuya's mother suffered from critical knee pain for many years, necessitating the construction of a Western toilet to support her health. Seeking assistance, they approached HASSS-Kolping India, which provides loans for sanitation programs. With support from HASSS-Kolping India, they obtained a loan in October 2022 and built the much needed toilet. Grateful for the financial support, they now face no difficulties and extend their heartfelt thanks to Kolping India and HASSS.





## LIVELIHOOD SUPPORT TO MIGRANTS

## Distribution of Tailoring Machines to Trained Migrant Workers

on January 5th 2023, Mallapur's migrant workers, hailing from Jharkhand and Bihar, primarily engage in daily-wage labor, facing harsh working conditions and a lack of access to social welfare programs. Seasonal employment leads to challenges in sustaining their families during off-seasons. Poor living and working conditions contribute to health risks, including nutritional diseases and alcoholism.

These workers often remain unaware of their rights as migrant laborers and face exploitation by unscrupulous agents who violate minimum wage laws. In response, Fr. Anthony Madanu conducted a situational analysis study, highlighting the severity of the issue. As a gesture of support, he provided sewing machines to three trained migrant families, aiming to enable self-employment opportunities for income generation. The initiative has sparked interest among more individuals looking to establish self-employment as an additional income source.

## ► PROVIDING SELF-EMPLOYMENT KITS TO THE TEN TRAINED WOMEN

Ten women from Alirajpet area within the age group of 18 to 35 were identified for tailoring training on the basis of their willingness to attend the training. At the end of the tailoring training course which lasted for three months, trainees were awarded with a training completion certificate. At the end of the training period, HASSS with the financial support from Elizabeth & Sebastian Muir was able to provide Sewing Machines to the trained women.



### ▶ PROVIDING EDUCATIONAL SUPPLIES TO 25 FINANCIALLY POOR CHILDREN

With the financial support from Elizabeth & Sebastian Muir, HASSS was able to provide educational supplies to 50 most affected children by the Covid 19 pandemic to return to school which is a supportive learning environment. During a half day interactive session, organized for these children, HASSS apart providing educational supplies to 50 children spread awareness to parents and children on taking care of health and psychosocial well-being too.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

#### Management's responsibility for the financial statements




















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
